Analyzing Data to Diminish the Violation of Human Rights Around the World

ver the world there have always been conflicts between different countries or groups and this has not changed in the past few years. There are still many wars ongoing in the world at the current time, in which many innocent victims are involved. To make sure that the human rights of innocent citizens that live in war areas are respected as much as possible, many organizations are concerned with these wars. The Human Rights Data Analysis Group (HRDAG) is one of them and is using data analysis to monitor this.

Working with incomplete data

The notion of Big Data has gained popularity in a number of business and industry applications in the past years. This could be used to successfully predict customer behavior, but could also be used to improve the circumstances of citizens that live in an area that is dominated by war. One big

difference between these two issues is the amount of available information. In human rights, and more specifically in studies of conflict violence, there is rarely access to complete data. Since it is too dangerous most of the time to enter these areas, the data has to come from public killings posted on social media, stories covered in the local or international press, victims' testimonies recorded by non-governmental human rights organizations and other similar sources. This means that a lot of data is not recorded.

Basing policy decisions on these kind of partial datasets that are biased can lead to misleading conclusions. Killings in urban areas may be almost always reported, while killings in rural areas are rarely documented. This could lead to the wrong conclusions, as a result from the data analysis

could be that violence is primarily urban, while this result is caused by selection bias. In order to derive the correct results, methods to estimate the bias of these observations are needed. An example of a conflict where HRDAG has developed techniques to estimate this bias is the Syrian Civil War, where HRDAG has analyzed data in the period 2011-2014.

Syrian Civil War

On March 15, 2011 a civil war started in Syria. The Syrian population was not satisfied with the current government and demanded better human rights. In this conflict a lot of different parties and countries were involved, which led to the death of many government soldiers, militia members, police officers and armed insurgents, but it also led to the death of countless innocent citizens. Because human rights were being violated during the Syrian Civil War, many human rights

organizations came into action, of which HRDAG was one of them.

When analyzing the data that became available for HRDAG about the deaths during the civil war in Syria, there are a few main questions that HRDAG tries to answer from this analysis. First of all an important question is whether more people are being killed in a certain year than in the year before that. It is important to know if the trend is increasing or decreasing in order to know if times are getting better or if the war is getting worse. Another question asked by HRDAG is in which region of Syria the majority of violence is occurring. In order to improve the situation, it is important to know where most help is needed and therefore how the help should be organized. A final important question will be if violence increases or decreases as control over a territory changes hands between different conflict parties. These questions can drive policy decisions, resource allocations and eventually transitional justice.

The data that is available for HRDAG has 318,910 reported killings and is derived from five different datasets. Because the data comes from five different datasets, this number of reported killings includes many duplicated observations, which should be removed. But after the removal of

these duplications the dataset will still be incomplete. Many observations are missing, because of unknown deaths of many persons. Although it is impossible to get these observations, it should be possible to derive an estimation of the amount of deaths during the civil war using the five different datasets and the two-system Lincoln-Petersen estimator. This estimator works as follows: assume we have two datasets. dataset 1 and 2, where dataset 1 has A observations and dataset 2 has B observations. Let's call the overlapping observations between the two datasets M. Now, let's say that the total amount of deaths caused by the Syrian Civil War is N. This means that with probability A/N a reported killing is in the first dataset, with probability B/N a reported killing is in the second dataset and, assuming that both datasets are independent, with probability A/N * B/N a reported killing is in both datasets. But this should be the same as M/N, since M is the intersection of A and B. By rewriting this as shown in Figure 1, we could ultimately get the Lincoln-Petersen estimator: N = AB/M. This way, it is possible to estimate the amount of killings, given the datasets that are available, which makes the answers to the questions that have been posed above more feasible.

When trying to answer the question whether the amount of killings has increased or decreased over time, the usage of the Lincoln-Petersen estimator is crucial to answer this question correctly. If we compare the amount of deaths in Hama and Homs (which are two areas in Syria) in the period December 2012 up to March 2013, we could see that the amount of unreported killings is pretty high in some periods. As we could see in Figure 2 (where lighter colors correspond to a higher amount of datasets in which the corresponding death was included), in January 2013 there were many killings that were not reported, which are represented by the dark figure in this picture. In this period the Syrian army and rebel groups were fighting for the control over Hama, which caused that not all killings could be reported by every data set. By only looking at the data of the datasets that we have, it looks like the amount of deaths decreased in January 2013. But the estimation of the amount of killing gives us a totally different conclusion.

What we could observe from the data is that Rural Damascus, Aleppo and Homs are the areas with the highest amount of deaths. Since these are the three largest cities in Syria, it is quite clear that the size of a city has a high impact on the amount of killings in the area. As HRDAG has done over time, it is also possible to have a look at the amount of undocumented killings



for each region. Looking at this data, it is possible to see that the estimated percentage of killings that are undocumented is alternating a lot for every region over time. Most likely this implies that heavy fights between the Syrian army and rebel groups were changing between regions over time, in which it is more difficult to enter the area and observe the amount of deaths.

When looking at the results in 2013 and 2014, it is clear that the amount of killings remains approximately the same over time, with the exception of huge increases in some months. These increases consist mainly of unreported data and are caused by increasing conflicts in that period of time.

Analysis in other countries

Of course there are many more countries and areas in the world where citizens live in constant danger and where human rights are violated. Another example is the Iraq war, where many violent deaths have been reported since the Allied Invasion in March 2003. Different data sources were available and could be compared with each other. When comparing two datasets, the results showed that a lot of events where many people have died were represented by both datasets (94.1% of events with more than 20 deaths) and few where less people have died were represented by both datasets. The fact that events with a higher amount of victims are more likely to be recorded into the data, could be explained by the fact that the media do care more about these larger events, than about the events where 'only' one or two people have died. From this result we could observe that many smaller incidents have been omitted from the research and although it seems from the data that most events had many victims, most likely the opposite is true.

These are only two examples of wars where many people have died and human rights were violated. HRDAG does research in many more different wars, where data has to be analyzed carefully, such that the right results could be drawn. This way the right decisions could be made to guarantee that human rights will be respected as much as possible in times of war.





MAK: Our MAKkers

Many of us already know MAK (Mentoraat Activiteiten Kommissie) because at one point in time we must pass the infamous course Statistics for Econometrics and MAK organizes a great tutoring course. But what are the other activities that MAK organizes that keeps the relative young board busy and who exactly are the members of the MAK board? We decided to find out. We sat down with the board on a Tuesday afternoon and asked them questions about their experiences as board members.

What are the Activities that the MAK organizes? You might not know it but during your whole study process MAK is not only present when you need tutoring. MAK helps prospective students by organizing 'student for a day' events. When you have decided that you're going to study at Tilburg University, MAK supports you with the introduction days and they also organize the first day of the TOP-week. It's not all formal since the informal activities such as the MAK-beercantus and the lunches of the pass-mentoring program are organized by them. Nevertheless, the organization is undoubtedly most known for their organization of Crash Courses and Tutorships.

Why did you choose to do a board year at the MAK?

Eveline: "I started by doing the first years committee and now I'm already active at MAK for nearly three years. It hasn't felt like I have been active for 3 years though! After being a member of MAK for three years it nearly felt natural to transition to a board position". Joël:"After finishing my Pre-Master and Master I wanted to become active. 
Rick: "I have two committees and so far I have learned the most trying to coordinate them. Personally I think the biggest take-

away from my relatively short board year - since we have only been a board for two months - is letting people in the committee their thoughts be heard. A Week to Never Forget


he Tilburg Orientation Program

The Teacher's Perspective

aving finished my Master's degree in 2018, the memory of my own student life is still quite fresh. One of the things I can vividly remember is how often I would find a certain situation, exam question, assignment, lecture or tutorial outrageously unfair and ridiculous. To my surprise, this sensation did not fade when I joined the EOR department, to start my PhD. Rather, the object of my frustration changed when I switched sides. Students, who seemingly just get annoyed when you try to challenge them into becoming a better (at least, more studied) version of themselves, are at least as tough to swallow. With this column, I am going to try to clear up some of this supposed misunderstanding, by offering a glimpse on our perspective.

Let us first consider a classic cause for student outrage: a difficult assignment. The most obvious thing to keep in mind when this happens is that your teacher is typically not trying to make you fail. Quite the opposite: any hard assignment or question is designed to make the student think about the course material and learn. Consider, for instance, the Computer Programming assignments that Ernst Roos and I designed when we were involved with the course. There were always two, and while the first one was significantly easier, it was always considered the harder of the two. Why? Because it was simply the first time that the average student was confronted with a programming assignment with many moving parts. This, in turn, meant that it took most students much more time than was realistically warranted by the small percentage of their grade the assignment determined... and meant that most students could not appreciate it all that much.

Now, let us fast forward to the part of the semester that the same students had just handed in their second (equally lengthy) assignment and were heading into their exams. For most students who put in the effort

to get through the assignments, two things were true: their grade so far was good and their skills had developed to the point that they would barely have to study for their exam. By suffering through the assignments, almost all students had engaged in a bunch of conversations about the material, written (and deleted) several hundred lines of code, visited online forums, and in doing so: learned. The point to take away from all of this is, in my opinion, that it is better (from a didactic point of view) to ask a difficult question and grade it leniently, than to ask an easy question.

The same principle holds for most difficult assignments; the teacher expects you to develop yourself in a way that makes your effort worth it. In a similar vein, the tendency to stop providing answers to homework exercises is seriously taking hold. This is not, as some students tend to believe, meant to annoy students, or because the teacher is too lazy to make the exercises himself. Instead, it is meant to boost tutorial attendance, and to encourage students to engage in some problem solving of their own, rather than looking at the solution too quickly. It may sound strange when a teacher tells you "have you googled your problem yet?", but puzzling your way to a solution using whatever resources are available is a very good way to develop your understanding of course materials, as well as brushing up on your basics.

So the next time you feel like your teacher is asking you for something totally unreasonable, just relax, breathe, stop throwing darts at his/her picture, and remember that it was at the very least intended to be there for the benefit of the student. Whether or not these intentions were realised, is of course another matter entirely.



How One Became an Econometrician

am very honored that I was asked to write a column in all issues of Nekst that will be produced this year. My plan is to tell you more about my background and from that perspective my motivation to do the things that I am doing within my profession

To describe my background I like to start with my parents. They both were raised in Rotterdam and moved to the province of Zeeland after my father was asked to take a position as a mathematics teacher in Zierikzee. They married in April 1960 and nine months later, January 21, 1961, I was born

Already from the first moment that I more or less knew how to read, I became obsessed by the rankings of several football leagues exposed in the daily newspaper. It for sure also helped that my all-time hero Johan Cruijff started his glory days. This was also the time of the Olympic Games in Mexico 1968 during which I closely followed the development of the ranking of the medals that were won by the different countries. In the winter there were the all-round speed skating championships broadcasted on TV, where the final ranking was made based on a weighted average of individual achievements on the four different speed skating distances. And of course 1968 was the year that the first Dutch guy, Jan Janssen, won the Tour de France, and every evening I was sitting in front of the TV closely following how Jan Janssen moved more and more closer to first place, which he finally conquered on the last day.

To make a long story short, I was, and still am, very interested in everything that had to do with rankings consisting of numbers, and sports of course, but that is a different issue. Furthermore, already during my primary school days it turned out I was exceptional in doing calculus, while at the

same time I was clumsy (I still am, unfortunately!) and not interested at all in all kinds of technical issues. So, when during my high school years I was tested to find out which academic study I should choose, it was no surprise that the word "Econometrics" came up. At that time however, I never had heard of it before.

Although my father was kind of disappointed I did not move to Delft to study Mathematics, in 1979 I moved to Rotterdam to study Econometrics and my parents have supported me ever since. I still remember how shocked I was after the first day of following lectures. From my high school experience I thought I would understand quite soon everything about mathematics, but on the first day at university the speed during the mathematics courses was so enormous and the notation so overwhelming, that I really doubted whether I was able to do this study. I was not the only one thinking that because during the first day about half of the students in Econometrics moved to Economics. However, I did not give up and after some time I became used to my new environment in all respects. So, after one year propaedeutic, one year candidate, and three years doctoral I graduated in 1984.

During the year of 1984 I applied for several positions and ultimately Tilburg University. which at that time was called Katholieke Hogeschool Tilburg, decided I could work for them. At November 1, 1984, I had my first working day in an office on the fourth floor of what now is called the Koopmans building. Now it is 35 years later, and I am still working in an office on the fourth floor of the Koopmans building. In these 35 years I taught several courses, got my PhD, wrote more than one hundred scientific articles, supervised more than a dozen PhD students, of which several also became full professor already, and supervised many bachelor and master theses. All of this work gives me a lot of pleasure!

From Liberal Arts and Sciences to Econometrics and Operations Research

n October 15, we had the pleasure to interview dr. Jochem de Bresser, assistant professor at the Department of Econometrics and Operations Research. He was born in Utrecht, but he spent most of his youth in Handel, a village close to Eindhoven. Before he started working at Tilburg University he worked at the University of Groningen. You may know him from the Master course 'Empirical Finance', but he also teaches the course 'Statistics for Premaster' and supervises Master theses.

After high school, he really did not know what he wanted to become, so he went looking for a study with many possibilities afterwards and ended up with 'Liberal Arts and Sciences'. Because he was too late to sign up for the Bachelor in Utrecht, he chose to do the Bachelor at Roosevelt Academy in Middelburg. He chose to do eight economics courses and a minor in statistics and mathematics. This helped him to start with the Master Economics and later also the Research Master, both at Tilburg University.

The year de Bresser started at Roosevelt Academy was the first year of the University in Middelburg. He started with 110 other students, who all lived in the same street on the campus. He lived with a total of ten persons in a house and because everybody lived on the campus, they already had a really nice group since the start of the year. After his Bachelor he went to Tilburg to start with a Master. There was a big difference between Tilburg and Middelburg. In Middelburg the school tried to occupy the students 60 hours per week. When he went

to Tilburg he immediately noticed that he had to study far less in comparison with Middelburg. In Tilburg he also moved into a student house. As a student you obviously want to go out sometimes and for them 'de Lamme Goedzak', Le Clochard or Philip was the place to be on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

During his student life, de Bresser did not join a study association, such as Asset, or a student association. In Middelburg there were almost no associations like this, because the school was so new. In Tilburg he decided not to join an association because he would only be there for a year. Especially after hearing stories from his younger sisters, who enjoyed student life in Utrecht and Maastricht. Throughout the summer holidays he often had side jobs like working in the catering or helping on a garbage truck. The most exciting job during his study time was helping at a yearly congress for haematology. A friend of de Bresser was involved in the organization of these congresses, which gave him the opportunity to work here. Every year the congress would take place in a different city in Europe, meaning that he could travel to cities like Copenhagen and Paris for his work. During these weeks he often had time during the day to explore the city, which made his job the perfect mini-vacation.

When he was younger and when he lived in Middelburg he was skating a lot. He still really loves the sport, but nowadays it has changed from active skating to passive skating. He doesn't skate anymore, but still goes to tournaments to watch the sport. When he started in Tilburg he moved from skating to fitness and boxing. Now, ten years later he is still boxing and together with his wife, he started with a new sport: bouldering.

He and his wife met during his time as a student at the Roosevelt Academy in Mid-



delburg. They really like to travel together and especially to mountain regions, since here they can hike and next time maybe even boulder together, which they love to do. She is from Romania and her family still lives there, which means they go there for a visit every year as well. They would love to make a camper roundtrip in the United States someday. Next to travelling, de Bresser and his wife enjoy going to the art house cinema and visiting the yearly Jazz Festival in Den Bosch. Their movie and TV preferences go out to documentaries, non-Hollywood movies and Netflix series like The Crown and Narcos. And of course, being an econometrician, playing board games is one of his favorite things to do as

Around Christmas de Bresser and his wife organize every year a dinner together with a group of friends and every year another couple gets to be the host. He and his wife enjoy cooking, so for their birthday in November they received a luxurious cooking workshop from their friends. But what they didn't know was that their friends were expecting the courses they had learned to cook to be served during the Christmas dinner. They spent three whole days preparing the food, since cooking for twelve people takes a lot longer than they initially thought it would. A typical working day starts with preparing all education related matters, since these tasks need to be finished before the lectures. Usually de Bresser works on two projects and alternates between these. A large part of his day consists of working on his laptop and doing research. One of the things that makes the job very exciting for him is going to international congresses and talking with people from all over the world about their working field. He really likes the fact that new projects constantly come to light and he is able to get creative with these.

After finishing your study Econometrics and Operations Research, he believes there are many different sectors in which you

can work because of the broad range of content of our study. He personally thinks it is very interesting to use a combination of statistics and economics to explain or predict human behavior. One of the most important developments in his working field is the large availability of data nowadays. Data is automatically being generated by services like Spotify and webshops and we are able to scrape data from the internet ourselves. This large amount of data offers a lot more opportunities for research.

When we asked de Bresser what profession he would choose if he had to choose another career path, he had to think for a bit. It is difficult to come up with a similar profession that carries the same amount of freedom as he currently has. De Dutch Central Bank could maybe be a good possibility, but working there on the research department does have a lot in common with working at Tilburg University. You would get some of the topics for your research from the government, but you would also be able to decide many of your research topics yourself. A whole different thing de Bresser would like to do is to coach children with all kinds of problems by doing sports. In his opinion, the direct impact you have on somebody can make you feel really happy. This will probably be more a dream than reality in the future. because in many cases you will have to be educated to do this work.

When we arrive at the final question of this interview: "What advice would you give Econometrics students in Tilburg based on your own experiences?" his answer is to have fun next to your study. After hearing that other students have to do more extracurricular activities next to their study nowadays and get stressed out because of this, he believes that econometricians probably do not have to worry about these kind of things. Econometricians almost always end up successfully, so make sure to enjoy your time as a student as much as possible.

The European Championship of Bridge for Students

My grandma plays that game every week..." and "bridge is only for old people... " are quotes that we as young bridge players hear quite often. Why is bridge only associated with retirement and considered to be boring? Almost all econometricians love playing games, especially card games, and all econometricians like statistics. Bridge is the best thinkable combination of these two aspects. The card game involves many statistical aspects and will always be a challenging mind game.

My parents have played bridge every week since I was young. In my younger years I was not interested in learning the game, since I considered bridge to be too serious for me. I expected the game to be boring like all other youngsters do, but I did like other card games which turned out to be familiar to bridge. I did play the card game 'rikken' quite often in which obtaining tricks is one of the aspects. This principle is also important in bridge. A few years ago I became interested in bridge and I wanted to change my opinion of the image of the game. Bridge is a very social game in which partnership is very important. The game is played by four players. Two people playing as partners against the other two. Partners sit opposite to each other. I recognized many statistic features in the game which attracted my attention. When playing I really enjoyed the

game and I decided to write my bachelor thesis about bridge. I analysed the skill level of the game, whether it is a game of chance or a game of skill. It turned out that a high level of skill is involved in bridge. In addition I calculated the probabilities on possible hand patterns. Every player obtains thirteen cards from a standard 52-card deck. There are four suits: spades, hearts, diamonds, and clubs. Every suit consists of thirteen cards. In 21.55% of all cases a hand with thirteen cards is 4-4-3-2 distributed. One example then is 4 spades, 4 hearts, 3 diamonds, and 2 clubs. Of course the suits can differ. This distribution pattern of 4-4-3-2 is the most frequently occurring hand pattern. The bridge game will never get boring, since it is almost impossible to get exactly the same hands twice in your life.

One year ago I told Anouk Casparie about the card game, but she reacted the same as most others: "my grandma plays it..." I convinced her that the game is really worth playing and the image that it has does not meet reality! It is way more fun than I expected in advance! I recommended the bridge course that is given by Ruud Hendrickx, He is not only a professor but also an advanced bridge player. During the course of seven weeks you will learn the basic principles of bridge and after these lessons you are able to play it yourself! Anouk attended these lessons from Ruud Hendrickx and she

really got infected by the bridge virus. We now play bridge at Theseus in Tilburg, which is very popular among students. There is a nice informal atmosphere, always nice music playing and you can have some drinks while playing. Every Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday there will be played from 20:00 hours. Every last Friday of the month a special pop quiz is organized after playing the bridge games. Each month a special bridge training is organized for youngsters in Utrecht. Here we get lessons from the best bridge players of the Netherlands. At one of the trainings Anouk and I met Floris Tulner and Tim van den Essen, who are both studying in Eindhoven and also like to play bridge. Together we attended different bridge tournaments in the Netherlands. We went for example to Alkmaar to play the 'Kaasstad' tournament where we all won a typical Dutch cheese!

The four of us were elected to represent The Netherlands, more specifically Tilburg University, at the European Championship bridge for students. The EUSA mind sport games took place at the University of Physical Education in the city centre of Budapest from July 24 until July 28. We were honored to represent The Netherlands at an international bridge tournament while we only have few years of bridge experience.

We decided to visit the city of Budapest before the tournament started. This city is









really worth a visit! Of course we didn't want to go to Budapest only for the bridge tournament, of course we also did want to see the highlights of the city. We had a guided tour through the city by bike and climbed to the famous viewing point. In the evening we went to some typical ruin bars, where we had a lot of fun! The day before the tournament really began, we went to the Szechenyi Spa. This is one of the largest bathhouses in Budapest. Here we have had a full day of relaxing in order to be completely prepared to start the tournament.

We had four complete days of playing, which all started at 09:00 hours at the University of Physical Education. Next to the bridge competition, there was also a competition in chess at the same time. In our free time we had some exciting lessons from the world's best chess players from Armenia. After the four days of playing bridge, the tournament ended with a luxury dinner for all participants and afterwards there was a great party at the university. It was fun to be together with all teams we played against. It is unbelievable to get the opportunity of playing at a European Championship! A few years ago I would have never believed that I joined the European Championship bridge for students in Budapest!
